#### 'No. 1 uncle,' Cardinals fan, gold medalist

Tripp Miller will be remembered as a kind, loving man. "He had a very happy, full life with his family," said his

mother, Patty Miller. Ray Donald "Tripp" Miller III, 49, of Joplin, was a resident of a home for the developmentally

enue, along with two of his friends, Mark Farmer and Rick Fox. All three died when the May 22 tornado leveled their house, which was close to the destroyed Joplin High School.

He was affectionately called Tripp because he was the "triple," or third, Ray Donald Miller of the family.

He worked for 27 years at Joplin Workshops Inc. and was a lifelong member of the First Presbyterian Church, where he attended services and Sunday school classes each week.

Tripp, who was given the title "No. 1 Uncle" by his five



nieces and four nephews, was family oriented, his mother said. As he grew up with his four siblings, he attended all of their school events and was their biggest supporter, she

"He truly was the center of all of our kids' lives," she said. "He went to everything they took part in, and they wanted him there."

Tripp also loved his extended family and was set to be a groomsman next month in his cousin's wedding in Kansas City, she said.

An avid sports fan, Tripp cheered particularly loudly for the St. Louis Cardinals and Missouri Tigers — especially football and basketball - since his siblings attended

the University of Missouri.
"He was a big Tigers fan,"
his mother said. "Tripp was a member of the Missouri Alumni Association and got all the information from it. It was very important to him."

Tripp participated frequently in Special Olympics, having won a gold medal just last year in bowling.

He had also been luckv enough to carry the Olympic torch a few years ago when the Special Olympics were held in Joplin.

He is survived by his parents, three sisters and one brother.

"He was a major part of our lives. He will be greatly, greatly missed," his mother said.



































## Daughter reunited with father's Bible

Woman cites kindness of two strangers

Ed Ash's Bible has seen bet-

But the book, nearly ruined in the May 22 storm, is now usable and safely in the hands of Ash's daughter, Brenda Nichols — thanks to the kindness of strangers. "It meant the world to us," she said.

Cyrus Edward Ash, 87, and his wife, Emma, had lived in the Greenbriar nursing home more than three years when the monstrous tornado ripped through Joplin. Ed was one of 153 people who perished in the storm; Emma survived, though she remained hospitalized on Saturday morning.

Ash became a devoted reborn Christian upon entering the nursing home, Nichols said. The Bible he used, a New International Version with his name written several times across the front in permanent marker, had likely been a gift from Nichols herself, she said.

"He read that Bible every day," she said. "He said, 'I don't understand a lot of it, but I keep reading.

The couple were both at the nursing home when the tornado struck. Ed was found lying on top of the rubble. Because he was in such bad shape, it was likely that he died before he reached the hospital, his daughter said.
